New Vegetation Management Plan Addresses Fire Risk

The recent history of major wildfires in San Diego County has made us all more aware of the potential hazard wildfire presents to those living near wild areas. To address this concern, the Conservancy began the process of creating a Vegetation Management Plan in the fall of 2008. This plan has now been completed, outlining important vegetation management measures relevant to fire risk mitigation.

As it was important to find broad community consensus on the issue, the Conservancy worked collaboratively with several partners, including the County of San Diego Parks and Recreation Department and the City of Solana Beach Fire Department. The plan was completed in consultation with the California Department of Fish and Game and also received input from the California Coastal Commission and the City of Encinitas Fire Department. Spring is a wonderful time to visit the Lagoon! Why? Bee see a rainbow. Not a rainbow in the sky, but a rainbow Lagoon. Do you think you can find the colors of the rain plants you might find along the trails: Spring is a wonderful time to visit the Lagoon! Why? Because on any given day you might see a rainbow. Not a rainbow in the sky, but a rainbow of colorful flowers throughout the Lagoon. Do you think you can find the colors of the rainbow? Here are examples of some



- Red: Coast monkey flower-can you see the grinning monkey face?
- Orange: Fiddleneck-when first blooming, flower heads look like neck of a violin (also called a fiddle)
- Yellow: Bush Sunflower-notice the dark center
- Green: New growth of leaves triggered by winter rains
- Indigo: Baby blue eyes—look for blue veins on the petals of this tiny flower
- Violet: Fiesta flower-the bristly hairs on the stems can cling to clothing

Don't forget to look for the flowers that don't fall within the rainbow colors. The popcorn flower is a favorite-can you guess its color?

to reduce the wildfire risk to lives and property in the Solana Beach neighborhoods adjacent to the San Elijo Lagoon Ecological Reserve, and to protect the public's interest in the Reserve. It guides the removal of exotic vegetation and thinning of native vegetation in select areas between the La Orilla Trailhead and Rios Avenue Trailhead for a fiveyear period.

Throughout the creation of the Vegetation Management Plan, the Conservancy was conscious of its mission to "preserve and protect" the habitat contained within the Reserve. A primary goal was to create a plan which protected Reserve lands and adjacent properties from unnatural threats posed by wildfire. Of equal concern, however, was protecting the Reserve from loss of critical habitat as a result of indiscriminant clearing of native vegetation. To help in this effort, the Conservancy led its partners on a field survey along the entire Reserve boundary with the City of Solana Beach. This allowed the team to see and decide firsthand where vegetation management needed to occur and, equally important, where it wasn't needed. As a result, five areas totaling 6.4 acres within the Reserve were identified to be in need of controlled vegetation management. Without the onsite inspection, the plan would likely have affected over five times as much native habitat.

Overall, the Conservancy and its partners feel that this plan reduces the fire threat to areas that need protection, while still preserving the public's interest in maintaining the natural habitat within the Reserve. To read and download the plan, please visit www.SanElijo.org/publications. *

A Look Back in Time

Driving north on I-5, descending from Solana Beach towards Cardiff, to your right on the immediate horizon is Schroeder Point. Note the chalk colored cliffs immediately north of Manchester Avenue and the vegetable field in between.

The point of land at the top of the bluffs was saved by the personal efforts of two of the San Elijo Alliance (S.E.A.) stalwarts and "original Pioneer Protectors" of the San Elijo Lagoon. A dredge and fill housing project had received San Diego County "tentative" approval for 700 houses between Solana Beach and Cardiff in the late 60s. Dr. Pete Schroeder DVM, President of the San Elijo Alliance, and attorney Eric Lodge challenged the Jaffe development slated for W. Lagoon Drive in Cardiff.

The developer "lost" three potential sites. Read on for the "rest of the story."

The Lagoon had been saved by the efforts of the San Elijo Alliance in persuading the Wildlife Conservation Board, an agency of the State of California, to purchase half of the Dome Ltd. lagoon acreage. Concurrently, the County of San Diego fulfilled its prior commitment to be a partner if another was found and wrote a check for \$465,000. The total original purchase was approximately 775 acres. The S.E.A. was a small group of activists who organized to oppose the 700 house Dome Ltd. development in the Lagoon.

Later, after the Lagoon purchase in the early 70s, the State Coastal Commission was formed. The Jaffe development atop the Cardiff sandstone bluffs planned an extension of Lake Drive down the bluffs to Manchester Avenue. The Alliance went to bat for the Lagoon viewshed, winning a precedent-setting decision from the Coastal Commission denying the Lake Drive connection. At the same time, the Alliance effectively eliminated the three additional sites in separate County hearings where Schroeder Point remains.

"This event will showcase the amazing abundance of different life forms one can find at the Lagoon and will be a great opportunity for the community to witness the natural treasures at our doorstep first-hand," says Doug Gibson, the Conservancy's Executive Director/Principal Scientist. "I am particularly excited about raising awareness for the beauty of the Lagoon with our children and our neighbors." Activities planned for May 16 include free guided walks, children's crafts, story time and face painting. There will also be live animal ambassadors, allowing all visitors to marvel at a magnificent hawk close-up or to see eye-to-eye with a brilliantly colored lizard. Other community organizations will offer informational booths and activities on a wide range of topics related to life in our watershed. Visitors can learn about drought-tolerant gardening, water conservation in the home, and how to protect the Lagoon and our oceans.

The Conservancy's staff scientists will be supported by experts from the San Diego Natural History Museum, the Scripps Institution of Oceanography, the University of California, Santa Barbara, California State University, San Marcos, and other organizations in the effort to find and identify as many different kinds of plants



and animals as possible. The final whistle will blow at 3 pm on Saturday, May 16, when the final tally will be announced to the public.

As one of the few remaining and largest coastal wetlands in Southern California, the San Elijo Lagoon is home to an exceptionally large number of different plants and animals. Visitors enjoy the six primary types of habitat on more than seven miles of hiking trails. The Lagoon Day celebration will offer unique opportunities for exploration, education, and entertainment around the Ecological Reserve. The free event is made possible by the generous support of the City of Encinitas and the Mizel Family Foundation, the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, DUDEK, Patagonia, Souplantation and the County of San Diego Department of Parks and Recreation.

Final tally of species identified at the San Elijo Lagoon BioBlitz and winners of prizes will be announced at 3 pm at the San Elijo Nature Center.
